# MicroGreen Greenhouse Tour with Mack McLaughlin

At our April meeting, Root & amp; Bloom Garden Club had the pleasure of touring the MicroGreen growing operation in Orting Valley. The owner has created a lucrative business of growing and selling his "produce" to the finer restaurants in mainly the greater Seattle area. I found his venue by talking to the Farm12 Restaurant in Sumner/Orting as they are one of his very pleased customers. It is quite a special niche to have your plate garnished, salad enhanced and your food seasoned with the tender young plants.

Mack starts his process in his original 10x12 green house where he prepares the trays (the plastic containers that the pastries are sold - cut in half) and fills them with dirt. He then lays a generous amount of seed on top and waters the plants with a solution of food-based hydrogen peroxide diluted with water. No extra dirt is added. Just seeds on top of dirt.



Next, he moves the trays into the larger greenhouse where he sets commercial baking sheets covered in seed trays aside for germination. After just 3 days' time, the sprouts had made tremendous progress and were almost ready to come into the light for further growing. Mack set up a watering and heating system that is not hard on the pocketbook as to not offset his profit margin and overall cost to his customers. He freely shared information about his seed supplier, resources for learning about microgreens and other valuable knowledge that he has learned along the way.



Once we entered the larger growing operation, Mack invited Jeanine Faulker to pick some blossoms off a cabbage plant for us to taste. Tamara Larson enjoyed the taste along with most of the Root & Bloomers in attendance. I am not a fan of any vegetables in my diet and I even found the taste to be pleasant. From here Mack shared tastes of many of his microgreens to include fennel, beet greens, onion, arugula, chick peas, borage, nasturtium, fennel, mizuna mustard and more. Root & Bloom members Linda Rexrode, Kathy Johnson, Cindy Swanberg, Patty Powers and Penny Swanson from Dogwood Garden Club enjoyed the feast.

We were amazed at how quickly Mack turns his seeds into profit. He and a partner plant on Saturdays and by Thursday or Friday of the next week, they are delivering their orders to restaurants and other customers. The plants are delivered still growing in their container so that all of the color, texture, and flavor of just picked produce are in prime condition to add to recipes and plates.



All of his produce is grown to order with a few extra's for the master chef to sample... that's called marketing at its best. Some if his offerings are seasonal but most "staples" are grown year round.

His edible flowers are also delicious. He sells fuchsia, wisteria, columbine, mini carnations, fruit blossoms and buttons (mum family) and more. The colorful edible flowers add an exotic flair to the plate. At the end of our tour, we were able to purchase sample-sized trays of produce to take home. Rosie Trujillo was just ecstatic to take some home to serve to her husband.



Mack also sells growing kits on his website. As we share the joy of gardening, this is a nice treat to try out. This fieldtrip was enjoyed by our members. Here is his information for everyone.:
